Poisoned by Lead

A Health and Human Rights Crisis in Mitrovica's Roma Camps

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In June 1999 the Roma neighborhood of the city of Mitrovica, in the north of Kosovo, was attacked by ethnic Albanians and burned to the ground. Its 8,000 inhabitants were left homeless and displaced. Many were resettled by Kosovo's United Nations administration in camps in a heavily contaminated location close to a defunct lead mine. The move was supposed to be temporary.

A decade on, Roma families are still in the camps next to the mine's toxic slag heaps, in dreadful living conditions. Some have serious lead poisoning. *Kosovo: Poisoned by Lead* recounts a decade of failure by the UN and others to provide adequate housing, medical treatment, and viable long-term solutions for the Mitrovica Roma, and makes detailed recommendations for how to end the crisis.
