









Denial of legal capacity deprives persons with disabilities from the enjoyment of other human rights such as the right to vote, the right to have a family, the right to health and medical treatment, consent to intimate relationships, etc. Until now, different countries have initiated legal reforms for the implementation of CRPD Article 12, but there are still not many commonly recognized legislative models of supported decision making worldwide.

This panel will discuss a number of pilot projects that explore supported decision making in practice, and will encourage the further exchange of ideas, models and solutions to shape the legal reforms and practices, government policies and programmes, as well as the everyday social practices of individuals, their supporters and communities.
